A Few Tips for Legislative Relationships

- **1. Timing:** The worst time to forge a relationship with legislators is during a session. Connections should be built during the interim.
- **2. Contact Info:** Keep your legislator's contact info handy.
- **3. Issues:** Legislators should know your city's goals, projects, challenges, and achievements.
- **4. Support:** Stay abreast of your senator's / representative's agenda. What are their priorities and aspirations? Are you in a position to assist them?
- **5. Speaking:** Can you provide opportunities to speak with your shared voters?
- **6. Recognition:** If your delegation is helpful, recognize those good deeds.
- **7. Dining:** Meeting for a meal is both common and customary. Buying someone lunch does not buy their vote; you just get a few quality minutes of their time.
- **8. Staff:** Get to know legislative staffs. Involve them in your activities.
- **9. Campaigning:** Re-election takes money and positive exposure. As the leaders of your community, you are in a unique position to offer (or withhold) support.
- **10.Accountability:** Is your delegation accountable to you and your town? If not, *are there consequences?* Are there political costs to opposing your city?
